Look for people




Enter their world

The Bible says that God is good.


The Bible says that God has a purpose for suffering.


Additional thoughts

- I listen for issues in data gathering that make the CE angry or defensive.
- I look for times in data gathering when the person is closed and self-protective.

Jesus & the Samaritan Woman John 4

The intentionality of Jesus' journey

[1] Now when Jesus learned that the Pharisees had heard that Jesus was making and baptizing more disciples than John [2] (although Jesus himself did not baptize, but only his disciples), [3] he left Judea and departed again for Galilee. [4] And **he had to pass through Samaria**. [5] So he came to a town of Samaria called Sychar, near the field that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. [6] Jacob's well was there; so Jesus, wearied as he was from his journey, was sitting beside the well. It was about the sixth hour.

The intentionality of Jesus' conversation

[7] A woman from Samaria came to draw water. Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink."

- She's a woman.
- She's an unmarried woman.
- She's a Samaritan woman.
- She's a part of a despised and disadvantaged minority group

Jesus faced the same obstacle that threatens to sabotage all counseling relationships from the outset: conflicting goals between the person wanting help and the person offering it. Conflicting goals often pit hurting people and their would-be helps against each other in a fruitless struggle of wills.

What was Jesus really after?

[21] Jesus said to her, "Woman, believe me, the hour is coming when neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem will you worship the Father. [22] You worship what you do not know; we worship what we know, for salvation is from the Jews. [23] But the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father is seeking such people to worship him. [24] God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth." [25] The woman said to him, "I know that Messiah is coming (he who is called Christ). When he comes, he will tell us all things."

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What was Jesus really after?

[26] Jesus said to her, "I who speak to you am he."

Jesus knew that the Samaritan Woman was suffering far more from an impoverished theology than impoverished circumstances. As long as she believe God was like her string of husbands and lovers—men who 'loved' only to get their own needs met—she'd never be able to really trust or enjoy his love.

It is fitting that the camera would pan to the Samaritan woman as the symbol of Christ's bride: a biblical symbol that represents the church. For as we know, as a Samaritan, she's both Jew and Gentile in one. And so is the church.



When pressed, hurting people can usually put into words their immediate goal for coming for help—get the person or things that's causing their distress to change. But few can tell you what they hope these changes will ultimately accomplish for them the ultimate difference they think it will make in their lives. They've spent little time thinking about what their souls thirst for even more than these things.



Speaking the truth in love





Mark 7—11: Jesus and interpersonal ministry

Identify where you might fall on the spectrum:



Confrontational



We biblical counselors tend to be pretty good at speaking truth, but I have learned from experience that it is often hard for us to speak truth within a genuine relationship. When people come in with their sins, struggles, and sufferings, we respond with "wise" answers. But it's often a one-way process with very little give and-take, where a relationship isn't that necessary. But, truth and relationship together are the fundamental ingredients of biblical counseling that "lives." Biblical counseling cannot be reduced to a few well-timed verses, a strategy for change, a prayer, and a handshake...Scripture is so much more robust and lively than that: it is Godbreathed...as a pastor and counselor, I aim to be as personal as He is.

How do we speak the truth in love?

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God.

Colossians 3:16

The process behind this is straightforward. Know the person; know Scripture. There were many suitable words for him in Scripture, such as endurance, groaning, and "how long, O Lord?" and we spoke of these. Meanwhile, the question remains: What is most apt for *this* person at *this* time? Scripture says much to us. The skill is to identify a theme from it that is most important for someone to have, right now. A struggling person needs one, clear word that is memorable to their soul. When you meet with someone, you could simply ask, "What do you remember from our last time together?" and then build on that. The more topics you address, the less direction the person will have.

Moralistic Behavior Change

Stirring up self-centeredness in order to get someone to do the right thing does not get at the fundamental self-regard and selfabsorption that is the main problem of the human heart. Consequently, it does nothing to address the main cause of the behavior you are trying to change. Moralistic behavior change simply manipulates and leverages radical selfishness without challenging it. It tries to use that selfishness against itself by appealing to fear and pride. But while this may have some success in restraining the heart's self-centeredness, it does absolutely nothing to change it.

Many self-help books advocate behavior change without heart change encouraging people to keep the same selfish goals, but find new and improved ways to achieve them.

Four aspects of this process


- Establish a direction and goals
- Clarifying responsibility
- Providing accountability
- Assigning homework [growth assignments]

What does God want [her] to think, desire, and do? At this point, we need to recognize that our agenda will not always be the same as the Lord's. Asking this question keeps me from confusing God's agenda with my own. I cannot lead a person if I don't know where we are going, and I must only lead people where God is calling them.

For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you might follow in his steps. He committed no sin, neither was deceit found in his mouth. When he was reviled, he did not revile in return; when he suffered, he did not threaten, but continued entrusting himself to him who judges justly.

1 Peter 2:21-23



Two extremes in accountability:

- Forget the gravity of sin= why all the bother (laziness)
- Forget the hope of grace= why bother at all (despair)

What does accountability provide?

- Accountability provides structure
- Accountability provides guidance
- Accountability provides assistance
- Accountability provides encouragement
- Accountability provides warning

Homework can be a vital piece of effective counseling, but poorly developed or generic assignments, no matter how wellintended, are unlikely to bear fruit.
